SPORTS BETTING IN 2019: OVERWHELMING PUBLIC SUPPORT FOR LEGAL SPORTS BETTING MARKETS


A recent Mellman Group survey of 1,000 registered voters revealed

- An overwhelming majority of Americans (63%) support the Supreme Court's ruling that struck down the sports betting ban.
- Two out of three people (66%) believe sports betting is best regulated by states and sovereign tribal governments.
- There is weak support (23%) for leagues getting a cut of wagers on sports. The majority of people (55%) opposed the idea.










